- Broom corn is a type of sorghum.
- The long-branched panicles were first used in the Dark Ages to make – you guessed it, brooms!
- Italy is the first place it was described in the late 1500s.
- Benjamin Franklin introduced broom corn into the United States in the early 1700s.
- Illinois was the major producer of broom corn in the 1860s!
- Broom corn yields between 150 to 300 brooms per acre.
